We must walk together for peace: Pope

People need to walk together in harmony to build a more fraternal world, Pope Francis said yesterday, reflecting upon his recent trip to Romania. The May 31-June 2 trip showed the important need "to walk together, both for Christians" when it comes to faith and charity, and for residents of a nation, when it comes to civic engagement, he said during his weekly general audience in St Peter's and toward full unity". Square.

As is customary, Pope Francis reviewed his trip to the predominantly Orthodox East European nation during his first general audience after the trip.

Yet he also used the audience to remind people to take part in the "One Minute for Peace" initiative on June 8. The day marks the fifth anniversary of the Pope's historic gathering at the Vatican with former Israeli president Shimon Peres, Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas and Orthodox Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew of Constantinople, and their "invocation for peace".

Every year since that meeting in 2014, the International Forum of Catholic Action has promoted "One Minute for Peace" every June 8 at 1 pm. The Pope said people of faith

are invited to pray for and people with no religious belief are invited to reflect on "a more fraternal world".

In his main audience talk reviewing his trip to Romania, the Pope noted his encounter with Romanian Orthodox Patriarch Daniel and the Permanent Synod of the Romanian Orthodox Church, where he reiterated "the desire of the Catholic Church to walk together in reconciled memory

"This important ecumenical dimension of the trip culminated in the solemn prayer of the Our Father," showing that | Why did you spill the coffee? "unity does not eliminate legitimate diversity."

The Lord's Prayer represents the "common heritage of all baptised. No one can say 'my Father' and 'your Father.' No, 'our Father,'" he said.

Adult faith John O'Connor- food For Faith

It's the feast of the apostle Thomas today (July 3). I have always felt an affinity with Thomas. He is often referred to as the "doubter" since he was not present when the risen Jesus first appeared to the other disciples and refused to accept the resurrection news as fact simply on the basis of his friends' testimony.

It was all very well for those others; they had already encountered the risen Jesus personally. They had seen Jesus' gaze of love with their own eyes and heard him speak consolation with their own ears. They had received first-hand experience of the risen Jesus. In fact, all Thomas was asking for (to experience the risen Jesus himself) was the same experience as the other apostles already had. Thomas was not doubting as much as seeking; he was expressing the desire of one who truly yearns for adult faith.

Children believe things simply because the adults they trust teach them. But as a child grows beyond toddler-like naivety into adolescence, healthy questioning becomes par for their course. In this process, the child becomes the adult who believes not simply because of the word and experience of others, but because they now know for themselves.

Too often Christians who grow to maturity in so many other ways, remain as children in matters of

faith. Our motivations, shame, and guilt might have more to do with childhood fears of punishment and desire for earthly rewards than with a mature and adult relationship with Jesus Christ. Such "faith" is vulnerable to every pressure. In fact, if belief is based on the earthly Christian community, the church, or priests (etc) then it might be a simple religious adherence, but risks being devoid of the beauty of the adult life

It is important to note that many young children and teenagers do have such an adult faith since their awareness of the presence of Jesus is the vivid and lively relationship at the centre of their daily lives. It is often more difficult for older people to let go of the attachments that the world presents as essential, and to relax into the loving embrace of Je-

While it is true that we are the children of God, we often imagine ourselves in this relationship as preschoolers. It is more helpful to think of ourselves as the adult children of God. Before my parents' death they were often asked what their children were doing now. They did not begin their response by explaining that we were now in our 30's and 40's! Yes we were still their children, but we were adults, and that nuancing makes a huge difference.

Thomas gives us the method for

moving from childhood faith, to the `child-Ĭike" faith of an adult:

- Don't be shy about doubt. We all doubt at times. There is no need to live in a pretence of belief. Talk to a good friend or seek wise spiritual counsel.
- Engage in conversation with Jesus. You might begin "I don't even know if you are there, or if you exist, but if you can hear me then

•When you do sense (perhaps not by touching as Thomas but our sense is not limited to five physical awareness's) that Jesus may be present, do

not hesitate to speak to him as your God, with awe and humility. Thomas in this moment was the first to profess "My Lord and My God". Thom Lateran Basi



Cardinal Newman to be canonised in October

During a consistory of cardinals yesterday, Pope Francis decreed that Cardinal Newman and four other blesseds will be canonised together in St Peter's Square.

Indian Sister Marian Thresia, founder of the Congregation of the Sisters of the Holy Family; Italian Sister Giuseppina Vannini; Brazilian Sister Dulce Lopes Pontes, and Marguerite Bays, a Swiss consecrated virgin of the Third Order of St Francis, will also be canonised.

Their canonisations will take place during the 2019 Special Synod of Bishops from the Pan-Amazonian region to be held at the Vatican on October 6-27.

John Henry Newman was a 19thcentury theologian, poet, Catholic priest and cardinal. Originally an Anglican priest, he converted to Catholicism in 1845 and his writings are considered among some of the most important Church-writings in recent centuries.

Ordained a Catholic priest in 1847, he was made a cardinal by Pope Leo XIII in 1879, although he was not a bishop. His conversion to the Catholic faith was controversial in Eng-

land, and resulted in him losing many friends, including his sister, who never spoke to him again.

The British cardinal founded the Oratory of St Philip Neri in England, and was particularly dedicated to education, founding two schools for boys. He died in Birmingham in 1890 at the age of 89.

In October, Cardinal Newman will become Britain's first new saint since the canonisation of St John Ogilvie in 1976.

The first miracle attributed to Newman's intercession involved the complete and inexplicable healing of a deacon from a disabling spinal condition.

His second miracle concerned the healing of a pregnant American woman. The woman prayed for the intercession of Cardinal Newman at the time of a life-threatening diagnosis, and her doctors have been unable to explain how or why she was able to suddenly recover.
