33rd Sunday of Year A

Jesus, in today's gospel parable of the talents, tells us a story of a wealthy landowner who was preparing for a long journey. He calls his three servants and divides his money between them, each according to their ability and expects them to administer these. To one servant he gave five talents, meaning a sum of money, to a second two, and to a third one.

It is surprising to hear that a rich person risks everything by entrusting his servants with his family wealth and going on a long vacation. The value of one talent is a considerable amount, not being mere coin but talent is a weight. Depending on the type of mineral being used, whether gold, silver or copper. In Jesus' time silver was the most common metal being used; so by converting a talent it amounts to a thousand pieces of silver. It is exceedingly quite a lot of money to give it away to the servants. The owner had complete trust in his servants, knowing that on his return he will get back his talents with profits on it

See how the rich man dished out his wealth to his servants: he gave it to each one to see how well they can invest his money and make profits for him. God gave each and every one of us different talents and gifts that only we can use. Not everyone is a teacher, not everyone is a doctor, not everyone is a nurse, not everyone is a business owner, not everyone is a preacher, not everyone is a comedian, not everyone is a nursing home worker. With these talents we are asked to invest and make a profit so that when the master comes, we give it back to him with the profit. God gives us ample of time to make use of those gifts or talents for the greater glory of God and the good of our neighbours, work colleagues, our relatives, friends and immediate families. We cannot only be a Sunday Christian by coming to church, receive Jesus then as soon as we leave the church doors, Jesus is put into our back pockets or in our bags and purse and hide Him in the cupboard till next time we go to church.

Jesus becomes part of us, we become part of Him, and our lives should reflect that to all that we meet and come into contact with, every day of our lives. Have time for others, visit the sick, share a joke or two with someone to brighten up their day, put a smile on someone's face with some kind words or a little gift. So it doesn't cost a thousand pieces of silver to do those simple and kind gestures towards our fellow human being. It's built in us, it's given to us on a golden platter without charge, lets invest or give it to others without charge. At the end of our lives we have to give back the talents with profit. What profit have we made so that we can genuinely say that I have got that in the bag already?

Pastoral Clarification Willed by Francis

A letter published by the Secretariat of Vatican State explains what Pope Francis said on persons of the same sex living together in the documentary "Francesco" (Francis).

It is a "pastoral" document for the use of Bishops, willed by the Holy Father himself, to give all the necessary clarifications, after the confusion caused by interpretations of the documentary, Vatican sources confirmed to *i* French edition.

the text, in Spanish, was published last October 31, without any other indication of origin or recipient, in the Facebook page of Monsignor Coppola, which indicates implicitly the origin of the letter (State Secretariat) and Francis desire to clarify the context of his observations, which were misinterpreted.

As Zenit did, the letter explains that during "an interview, more than a year ago, Pope Francis responded to two different questions in two different moments, which, in the mentioned documentary, were edited and published as just one answer without due contextualization, which has generated confusion."

Pastoral Reference

In the extract that has caused disturbance in the media, the Holy Father made "a pastoral reference, in the first place, about the need that, within the family, a son or daughter with homosexual orientation never be discriminated. It is to them that the Pope's words refer: 'homosexual persons have the right to be in the family; they are children of God, they have the right to a family. No one can be thrown out of the family or make his/her life impossible because of it," reads the text.

To illuminate the Pope's statements, the document refers to point 250 of the Post-Synodal Apostolic Exhortation *Amoris Laetitia* (2016) on love in the family. "I took into consideration with the Synodal Fathers the situation of families that live the experience of having in their midst persons with homosexual tendencies, an experience in no way easy either for the parents of for their children. Therefore, we wish to reiterate, first of all, that every person, regardless of his/her sexual tendency, must be respected in his/her dignity and received with respect, endeavoring to avoid 'any sign of unjust discrimination,' particularly any form of aggression or violence. In regard to families, it's about ensuring a respectful accompaniment, so that those who manifest a homosexual tendency can count on the necessary help to understand and carry out fully the Will of God in their life."

Local Law of Ten Years Ago

The letter then refers to the next question of the interview, which, "instead, was an inherent change to a local law of ten years ago in Argentina on the 'egalitarian marriages of same-sex couples and of the opposition of the then Archbishop of Buenos Aires in this regard."

In this connection, it continues, the Pontiff "has affirmed that it's an incongruence to speak of homosexual marriage," adding that, in that same context, he had spoken of the right of these persons to have certain legal coverage: 'what we have to do is a law of civil coexistence; they have the right to be covered legally. I defended that."

The Doctrine Is Reaffirmed

The document goes on to refer to the words that the Bishop of Rome pronounced in an interview in 2014. "Marriage is between a man and a woman. The secular States want to justify civil unions to regulate different situations of coexistence, moved by the need to regulate economic aspects between the persons as, for example, to ensure health care. They are coexistence pacts of a different nature, of which I would not be able to make a list of the different forms. It's necessary to look at the different cases and to evaluate them in their variety."

Hence, "it's evident that Pope Francis referred to specific State dispositions, and certainly not to the Doctrine of the Church, reaffirmed numerous times over the course of the years," it concludes.

TO UNDERSTAND SOME EXPRESSIONS OF THE POPE IN THE DOCUMENTARY "FRANCIS"

In recent days, some affirmations contained in the documentary "Francis," of screenwriter Evgeny Afineevsky, have triggered different reactions and interpretations. Therefore, some useful elements are offered, with the desire to foster a correct understanding of the Holy Father's words.

Over a year ago, during an interview, Pope Francis responded to two different questions in two different moments that, in the mentioned documentary, were edited and published as only one answer, without the due contextualization, which has generated confusion. In the first place, the Holy Father made a pastoral reference about the need, within the family, that a daughter or son with homosexual orientation never be discriminated. It is to them that these words refer: "homosexual persons have the right to be in the family; they are children of God, they have the right to a family. No one can be thrown out of the family or have his/her life made impossible because of it."

The next paragraph of the Post-Synodal Apostolic Exhortation *Amoris Laetitia* (2016), on love in the family, can illuminate these expressions. "I took into consideration with the Synodal Fathers, the situation of families that live the experience of having within them persons with homosexual tendencies, an experience that's not at all easy either for the parents or the children. Therefore, we want to reiterate first of all that every person, regardless of his/her sexual tendency, must be respected in his/her dignity and received with respect, endeavoring to avoid 'any sign of unjust discrimination,' and, particularly, any form of aggression and violence. A subsequent question of the interview was a change inherent to a local law of ten years ago in Argentina on "egalitarian marriages of same-sex couples" and the opposition of the then Archbishop of Buenos Aires in this regard. In this connection, Pope Francis affirmed that "it's an incongruence to speak of homosexual marriages," adding, in this same context, that he had spoken of the right of these persons to have certain legal coverage. The Holy Father expressed himself thus during an interview in 2014. "Marriage is between a man and a woman. Day of the Poor 2020 - "Stretch forth your hand to the poor"

The Fourth Day of the Poor is Sunday 15th November. Pope Francis has called on people to keep their gaze fixed on the poor, especially during the Covid-19 pandemic, and warns against succumbing to a "whirlwind of indifference". This year's theme is "Stretch forth your hand to the poor", taken from the book of Sirach. Pope Francis points out that "prayer to God and solidarity with the poor and suffering are inseparable." Now is a good time to recover 'the conviction that we need one another, that we have a shared responsibility for others and the world'." In a word, he continues, "until we revive our sense of responsibility for our neighbour and for every person, grave economic, financial and political crises will continue."

Even during this pandemic, the Word of God "constantly impels us to acts of love," Pope Francis says. He also describes how the command: 'Stretch forth your hand to the poor' "challenges the attitude of those who prefer to keep their hands in their pockets and to remain unmoved by situations of poverty in which they are often complicit." Concluding his message, the Pope recalls that in the book of Sirach it is written, 'In everything you do, remember your end'. He continues by saying, "the 'end' of all our actions can only be love. This is the ultimate goal of our journey, and nothing should distract us from it."
