The following was writ ten on 16th May 2019:

Kia tau te rangimarie ki a koutou,

A few weeks ago at a parish meeting I reminded all gathered that

Pope Saint John Paul II had told us that "First of all, I have no hesitation in saying that all pastoral initiatives must be set in relation to holiness." (Novo Millennio Ine-unte 30) A few years later Pope Benedict wrote of the cen-trality of the Word of God and said "let the Bible inspire all pastoral work" (Verbum Domini 73). They are two excellent reasons for us to remember that ALL our parish and school meetings should begin with a substantial time of prayer.

I then asked someone to read out the following story as part of the prayer to begin the evening.

I heard once a story about a young African called Kahua. Kahua lived in the hills above a vast savannah in East Afri-ca. One day he came down to the savannah and turned up at the Catholic compound where he met the priest. Kahua asked for a job for six months and as the priest urgently needed someone he was given a job. It turned out that Kahua was honest and industrious, imaginative and reliable and above

all he got on with everyone so the priest came to rely on him. The priest was shocked when just short of the six months Kahua came to him to tell him that the time was almost up and he would be leaving in a week. "No Kahua, you can't go. I need you. I know I have been cranky and difficult at times and I probably haven't paid you enough but I promise to be better and make it up to you." Kahua explained that it really wasn't about money. He reminded the priest that his original request had been for a job for six months. When pushed he also explained that he lived in the hills and that one day when he was thinking about his life he had looked out on the savannah below where he saw the Christian compound and the Muslim mosque. He knew they were among the great world religions and thought they might have the answers he was searching for. So he told the priest, "/ thought / would go and work for you and the imam for six months each and then I would know which religion was best for me. Now it is time to go to work for the imam." "My God, Kahua, why didn't you tell me?" muttered the priest. But the fact is most people don't tell us. They watch us. It is our witness not our homilies that is important.

Our parishes are about building loving supportive communities, reaching out to one another and creating places and spaces where everyone feels accepted and welcomed, where they know they belong. Last Friday in Blenheim at the Vigil for Fr John Pearce and at the Mass in the Marlborough Convention Centre on Saturday the constant message was one of thanks for the way John had "connected" so many people and so many diverse communities in the vast Marlborough area. It was his witness and his reaching out to others that was deeply appreciated.

Are we creating close and warn relationships in our parish and school communities, in our families? Does each person know that they are held in a network of solidarity and belonging? Do we enable others to find contentment and friendliness in our communities?

What would Kahua say if he was looking at us?

Preaching the Gospel

"Things are Changing for Rome, for the Church, and we hope at our Australian Plenary Council



One of the priorities of Pope Francis is to re-organise the way the administration of the Church works. He has circulated around the world a draft of a coming official document called "Preaching the Gospel". This document has been six years in planning for Pope Francis. In this draft Francis states that the everything about the way the Church works is for the sake of the Gospel Mission – Preaching the Good News.

In a recent homily, Pope Francis was preaching on the passage in Acts of the Apostles where the apostles make the painful decision not to impose their longstanding Jewish traditions on converts from paganism.

Pope Francis said that it took courage to let go of some of these "important religious traditions and precepts,

adding that this threatened the Jewish-Christians' "religious identity." Instead, the apostles discerned that "proclaiming the Lord comes first and is worth more than everything else" – including "those human convictions and traditions that are more of an obstacle than a help."

Changes have to happen, says Pope Francis, and he went on to say: "To follow the Lord, it's necessary to walk fast and, to walk fast, it's necessary to lighten oneself, even if that costs ... In reforming ourselves we must avoid window-dressing, namely, pretending to change something while in reality nothing changes..."

And change doesn't mean that those at the top make all the decisions -everyone needs to have their say. "Humility is born when, instead of talking, one listens, when one ceases to be at the center. It's always important to listen to the voice of all, especially of the little ones and the least. In the world those who have more means speak more, but among us it can't be that way," the pope warned.

"God loves to reveal Himself through the little ones and those who are least. And he asks that no one look down upon anyone," the pope continued.

His message here is that there is certainly room for a variety way of doing things, that one group or place (including the Vatican) cannot control everything and everyone. "Love" said Pope Francis. doesn't create uniformity but communion."

Jesus said to his disciples:
"As the Father loves me, so I also love you.
Remain in my love.
If you keep my commandments, you will remain in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and remain in his love.

When I spend time with any gospel passage I feel challenged. This happened again this morning with today's gospel.

On first glance I felt comforted in the powerful reminder from Jesus that I am loved and that my experience of this love brings me joy, complete joy.

And then I pondered the word

"remain." "Remain" in my love. The message is clear. Being in God's love is our default setting. It's not that we work and pray hard to earn this love, it is a natural, a given. However we are free to escape this love and tragically too often that is what I do.

I leave my "home" in God's love, and run off in every other direction, grasping at anything that promises a moment of happiness. And this is a problem we share. We are all runners – running from God's love, escaping the relationship in which we are most loved and compulsively putting all our trust in projects, possessions and people

An Invitation:

Today, every time you think of it, take five seconds to return to your default setting, that is, knowing that you are loved by Jesus. In this relationship everything else in life falls into right perspective.
