Kia tau rangimarie ki a koutou, In these Covid days and these days and weeks of uncertainty, constant change and many challenges, many people are finding it very difficult due to the limitations imposed on our lives by the threat and pressures of Covid 19. We know that a lot of people are out of work and struggling financially, others are working in difficult and trying circumstances, our social life has been disrupted, and for some mental health and wellbeing are a growing concern.

For our Parish, School and College communities, for families and individuals our whole way of praying has been disrupted. Many are finding it very hard at the moment while there are no Masses on Sundays under Alert Level Two. I understand how trying, testing and tough it is with no Sunday Masses. The decision not to have Sunday Masses, where it is very difficult to ensure that there are no more than one hundred people present, was made solely in order to keep everyone safe and to prevent the spread of the virus. As the Prime Minister said recently "this is a tough year." This means that we look for ways to support and help one another more than we have ever done before. A few weeks ago in one of his Wednesday Audiences Pope Francis said "the pandemic has highlighted how vulnerable and interconnected everyone is," and then went on to say "the pandemic is a crisis, and we do not emerge from a crisis the same as before: either we come out of it better, or we come out of it worse."

This is not a time to complain, it is not a time to feel sorry for ourselves. This is a time to give hope to one another, and in our parishes in particular to look for ways to make a "new start." Maybe the new start will come about when each of us looks for ways to sow seeds of love and compassion and inspire others to care for those who are suffering because of the virus. Every blessing. Cathedral Campaign- Fr James Lyons visit

Many of you are no doubt aware that the Cathedral of the Sacred Heart in Wellington has been closed for some time (almost 2 years now), and the Cardinal and a group from the Cathedral Parish of Thornden are planning to repair and strengthen the roof and also begin improvements and refurbishment of the Cathedral.

The Committee for raising the funds have already raised \$3 million towards the project, and work on a major part of the restoration began last month. Then a huge boost to the work was received in August with a Government grant of \$8.5 million

from its Covid-19 'shovel ready' infrastructure fund. There is an estimated \$5 mill. still to be raised. The total cost of the project is estimated at \$16.5 million.

Fr James Lyons is the Cathedral Campaign chair and he will visit our parish of Star of the Sea from 2nd to 6th October. Father Lyons will be seeking assistance from the parishioners towards the work of strengthening and refurbishing our Cathedral.

I know these are difficult times, but please consider the opportunity to give towards making the Cathedral an enduring and beautiful legacy for the Catholic people of tomorrow.

The End of Life Choice Act

At the coming elections which have been announced for 17th October, but which actually begin for those who wish to cast a postal vote on 3rd October, two Referendums will also be put before us to consider and vote on:-

One is whether New Zealand should allow the recreational use of cannabis, and the other is whether you approve that people who have terminal illness may choose to have drugs administered to them in order to terminate their life, or that they may be given the means whereby they themselves may terminate their life. This latter referendum is called the End of Life Choice Act. If more than 50% of people vote in approval, then the Act will come into force and legal 12 months after the date of the election.

This latter is a very serious matter that we should carefully consider. Most of us have had friends of one kind or another who have had a difficult battle with cancer or another debilitating disease. Is it doing such people a service that they may quietly and efficiently have someone put them out of their misery

If we truly believe in a God, who has given us life and has revealed himself to our world in Jesus our Lord, then we must not get trapped into a neo-liberal thinking that dominates many people's decisions and thinking today. God alone has given us life and he has given us a day when we were born and there is a day when each of us will die. None of us are permitted by his Laws made clear in the Old and New Testament to take our own life or to assist in the taking of the life of another innocent person. God's commandment is very clear: "Thou shalt not kill."

Let us be loud in our support for the "No" vote.

Secondly, to give the excuse that people are in pain and should have the right to end his or her life - in effect denies the dignity and the power of the Cross of Christ. For a Christian it is a privilege to stand at the foot of the Cross and to share in the sufferings of Christ through my own burden or death.

We are to help people to see that illness or suffering – for all its trials and unpleasantness is a sharing in the Passion of Jesus our Saviour.

People today love to see celebrities who seem so charmed and beautiful and suffering free. However we all know that the gloss of the media paints an unreal world. Life has its bruises, its boredom, its disappointments and its hurts, as well as the joys and pleasures that God gives to us. To wish only for the peaks of human experience without its valleys and disappointments is to effectively deny the meaning of the sharing in the Passion and the Cross.

We are to embrace the lame, the disabled, the elderly, the person suffering mental illness and by our love and acceptance of them, we help their experience of the Cross to have meaning and value. This Referendum is a law that in a sense tries to continue and finish off the work of Nazi Germany. In those times not so long ago, Hitler and his cohorts tried to send those who were disabled or not of a certain racial kind to the extermination camps. If we add our voice for this vote to become a yes vote – we are taking part in a form of eugenics that thinks the world and our nation is only for the fit and beautiful and

healthy.

Let us be loud in our support for a No vote!
